

The Primary PE Sports Premium is provided by the government in addition to main school funding. It is designed to improve the provision of PE and Sport for the benefit of all children at St Polycarp's Catholic School, so that they develop and maintain healthy, active lifestyles, and are equipped for lifelong participation in physical activity and sport. St Polycarp's Catholic Primary School will receive £19,600 for the academic year 2023-24.

We will evaluate the impact of the Sports Funding as part of our normal self-evaluation arrangements. We will look at how well we use the Funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and Sporting provision, so that all our pupils develop the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary for a healthy, active lifestyle. Measuring the impact of the activities provided can be achieved in the following ways-

- Audit the numbers of pupils involved in out-of-school clubs, which promote healthy lifestyles
- Assess the progress in PE and Sport
- Monitor pupil participation, interest, and standards in competitive and non-competitive sport
- Consider other areas of development including self-esteem, confidence and attitudes towards physical activity
- Consider pupil voice through our 'Sports Council, Young Leaders, Sports Crew and assess the standards of physical development during social times
- Assess the impact of professional development in improving the teaching and learning of PE and Sport

To improve our provision of PE across the whole school for the academic year 2023-24, we plan to spend our Primary PE Sports Premium on the following

- Key indicator 2: The profile of PE and sport being raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement
